Do you remember doing those old 'Spot the difference' puzzles? You don't seem to see them so much these days, there were two pictures that looked identical, you needed to look carefully and find the often tiny differences in them.

We are living in times when people are asking more and more - what's the difference? Not too long ago we read of the differences in the amount paid to BBC journalists who were male and female. There was a significant difference in the amounts paid with the females receiving much less. Today I was reading an article where Steph McGovern from BBC Breakfast has said that there's a disparity between presenters who are 'posh' and herself (she comes from the north-east and speaks with a strong northern accent). I wonder what her 'posh' colleagues think?! More and more, equality is called for in lots of different areas

There is no doubt that we are all different and I'm not here to discuss the relative merits of that. But there is one area where we are all the same men, women, young, old... the list continues. The Bible makes very clear 'There is no difference... for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God'. I remember being hit by that verse on a poster at the Birmingham City Mission Care Centre where we often used to go to help and lead a short devotional time. I often struggled as I talked with people who very often through no fault of their own had so little in comparison to my 'luxury', but those words made me realise that whatever our differences – we were all sinners

That verse though is followed by another: 'But God treats us much better than we deserve, and because of Christ Jesus, he freely accepts us and sets us free from our sins' (Romans 3 v 24 CEV). Although all are sinners, not everyone accepts that free gift that Jesus offers. It doesn't matter what your accent is or your background, male or female, old or young - that offer is there for you. Have you taken it? One thing is sure – the benefit might not be financial - but it's of greater value than anyone can earn!

Kevin Deighton Missionary Secretary A lot of activity has happened in the short month of February, partly due to administration problems with the bank account which have delayed payments being made. The good news is this has been rectified so I will update you on the gifts sent in February.

£200 has finally been sent to Karen Baxter at Veritas. We had been trying to set up a direct quarterly payment to her since September without success so we have reverted to the old cheque payment and another donation will be sent shortly. We sent £100 to the WRU Home Missions re their annual appeal for funding and also £100 to the WRU Overseas Missions, again from a letter to our Church passed on at our AGM. This gift together with £77.37 raised when the High Street had the Christmas Lights turn on has been sent for use in the Union's Project in Yemen, see the Contact magazine for details.

At the end of January we had our annual Leprosy Mission Sunday and £68 was donated in the envelopes. £63 has been allocated to pay for a child's 12 month's education in Niger, another gift of £50 has been sent for their general funds. £100 went to Open Doors and their work amongst the persecuted Church and £100 to NOVIMOST as they start to prepare for their Spring/Summer Camps in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

I must apologize for what seems like a shopping list, hopefully next time I can give more substance to our charitable giving.

God is able to forgive

'Jesus said to the man, 'Take heart, son; your sins are forgiven.'

(Matthew 9:2).

A Sunday school teacher asked her class, 'Can anyone tell me what you must do before you can obtain forgiveness of sin?' One small boy spoke up, 'Sin'!

If sin is our greatest problem, then forgiveness is our greatest need. The story of the healing of the paralyzed man (matt 9 v1-8) reminds us that God is able to forgive our sins.

Jesus' first words to the paralytic focus on forgiveness, even though his friends lowered him through the roof to be healed by Jesus. Matthew is making the point that forgiveness precedes healing, as Jesus came first to restore our relationship with God as Father. Like the man, we too can be paralysed by past actions, hurtful words and unforgiveness, that leave us guilty and ashamed. Jesus offers us forgiveness and acceptance to enable a fresh start in our lives

Jesus was aware of the criticism of the teachers of the law, who believed that only God could forgive sins. As Jesus says, 'Which is easier: to say, "Your sins are forgiven," or to say, "Get up and walk".' Jesus secured forgiveness on the cross, which secures transformation from the inside. It gives us power to forgive others and ourselves from past hurts and actions.

Finally, Jesus says to the paralysed man, 'Get up, take your mat and go home.' The man's trusting obedience enables him to be completely healed and go home. Where do we need to know forgiveness in our lives and relationships? Are we ready to receive what God promises in our lives?

'If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness.' (1 John 1:9).

Constance Coltman

If you watched Songs of Praise on Sunday 4th February, you would have seen a short feature about Constance Coltman (nee Todd). Ann Bryant saw it and was moved by her story and asked if we would do a short piece in this edition.

Constance Todd was born in 1889 and became conscious of a call to the ministry but she was told that ordination in the Presbyterian Church of England would be impossible. The President of the (then) Congregational, Mansfield College, Oxford was persuaded that her call was genuine, and she was accepted as a student in 1913. On 17th September 1917, she and her fiancé Claud Coltman were ordained – she was one of the first women to be ordained to the ministry. The following day they were married. They ministered together until 1949. She said: 'The only right that no branch of the Church has ever denied to women has been the right of confessing the faith by martyrdom.'
